Largest insurer in AZ, covering over 2.5 million individuals and families...

AHCCCS uses federal, state and county funds to provide health care coverage to the state's Medicaid population.




More than 120,566 health care providers are registered with AHCCCS.



Payments are made to 12 contracted health plans that are responsible for the delivery of care to members.




### **AHCCCS System Overview**




#### Prevention—PAX GBG




## ASAM CONTINUUM® Implementation

- AHCCCS providers who conduct substance use disorder (SUD) and co-occurring SUD and mental health assessments for MCO-enrolled members aged 18 and older will be required to utilize the ASAM CONTINUUM® based on the roll-out timelines established by ASAM CONTINUUM® Steering Committee



YoY: Percentage Change in MAT




Overall \$\triangle\$ 56% Percent Change in MAT from 2018 to 2021

\*Those diagnosed with Opioid Use Disorder (OUD) in any of the first 13 diagnosis positions on a claim or encounter. MAT in this report refers to members diagnosed with OUD and have been prescribed MAT within 90 days of the OUD diagnosis to treat opioid dependence & addiction. The 3 medications of MAT are Methadone, Buprenorphine and Naltrexone. Per NCQA standards, MAT can be administered to individuals aged 16 years and older.

Percentage Change - 2018 to 2021

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


### Naloxone Programs

#### **ADHS**

- \$4 million per fiscal year for naloxone distribution
- Distribute to over 450 agencies in Arizona
- County naloxone distribution model
- Order directly from azdhs.gov/opioid

#### Sonoran Prevention Works

- Community based naloxone distribution model
- Provides community education and training on how to administer naloxone including IM formulation
